Journal of the Entomological Society of Ontario Renamed! - Yves Prevost, JESO Editor

been **h**ere have three changes to our journal over the past year. First, the society voted at the last general meeting in Ottawa to rename our journal, the Journal of the Entomological Society of Ontario (JESO). The old name, the Proceedings of the Entomological Society of Ontario, seemed to have passed its time and many stated that a new name was needed to reflect the content of our publication, in that it is a fully refereed journal of international status (Table.1 on page 2).

Second, I would like to welcome Ms. Karen Jamieson, chief of publications at Great Lakes Forestry Centre of the Canadian Forest Service in Sault Ste. Marie, as the journal's new technical editor. Karen brings a lot of experience as she has been working with scientific publications since 1980.

Third, the board agreed that every new volume of JESO should have a review article to increase the citation impact of our journal. The board agreed that page charges will be covered for the accepted review article. If you have suggestions for a review article that would be of interest to entomologists in Ontario, please submit a proposal consisting of the goal and the importance of the topic and an outline of the article by subtopics.



Volume 133 is well on its way, and should hold a review article, four regular articles, one note and two book reviews; three articles will be in agriculture, two in systematics and one in forestry. Once again, Coleoptera will be the major theme! Not surprising in that Coleoptera hold the largest number of species.

Finally, I invite all members to consider publishing in our journal. The time from submission to publishing is less than one year if all goes well with the manuscript. There are no deadline dates, so just submit your articles any time. I look forward to reading about your work in the near future!

2002 Annual Meeting

The 139th ESO Annual Meeting was held in Ottawa, October 18 – 20, 2002 at the Embassy West Hotel and Conference Centre. The theme of the meeting was "Invasive Species and Biodiversity." Attendance at the meeting was exceptional despite the tempting alternative of brilliant colours in the Gatineau hills and beautiful fall weather.


The Annual Meeting, organized by Bruce Gill and Peter Mason, included a 'mixer' on Friday night, the feature symposium on invasive species and biodiversity on Saturday morning and a full afternoon of student posters and presentations as well as regular member presentations. A Banquet was held on Saturday evening featuring Gary Umphries' highly entertaining discourse on "Insect invasion and its cultural consequences". Sunday morning held a full slate of regular member presentations as well.

Crystal Ernst of Carleton University received the President's Prize from ESO President Barry Lyons for her presentation titled "The effects of an invasive vine, Vincetoxicum rossicum (Asclepiaceae), on arthropod diversity in old fields". Janisse Bailey of the University of Guelph was a double winner at the Annual Meeting receiving both a student travel award


and the President's Prize for her poster entitled "Impact of carbofuran (Furadan®) and spinosad (Tracer®) on honey bees foraging in sweet corn". Steve Offman of Laurentian University was also a recipient of an ESO Travel Award to attend the Annual Meeting in Ottawa.

2002 President's Prize Winners and Travel Awards

President's Prize Winner for Oral Presentation 2002: Crystal M. Ernst



The effects of an invasive vine, Vincetoxicum rossicum (Asclepiaceae), on arthropod diversity in old fields

swallow-wort Pale (Vincetoxicum rossicum) is an alien invasive vine that is an emerging pest in natural areas in Ontario and northeastern U.S. To assess the impact of V. rossicum on arthropod abundance and diversity, arthropods were collected from monotypic stands of V. rossicum, common milkweed (Asclepias syriaca), goldenrod (Solidago altissima), and mixed graminoids using pitfall traps and by sampling individual plants. Arthropods were counted and identified to functional group. As expected, there were

few herbivores on *V. rossicum* foliage, and, probably as a consequence, few predators. As well, the abundance and diversity of ground-dwelling arthropods was lower under *V. rossicum* than under goldenrod or grasses. If *V. rossicum* is successful at displacing grasses and goldenrods, the impact of this invasive plant on old-field arthropods will be considerable.

President's Prize Winner for Poster Presentation 2002:
Janisse C. Bailey



Impact of carbofuran (Furadan ®) and spinosad (Tracer®) on honey bees foraging in sweet corn

This study compared the potential risks posed to honey bees by the current industry standard for European corn borer (ECB) (Ostrinia nubilalis Hübner) control, carbofuran (Furadan®), to a new biocide, spinosad (Tracer®). The acute toxicity and behavioral changes caused by carbofuran and spinosad to honey bees was evaluated using three different assay techniques: direct contact, residual contact and oral. Findings from direct contact and residual contact assays are discussed.



Treasurer's Report Blair Helson

The following is the financial report for the period, 19 October, 2001 to 18 October, 2002. A financial summary for this period is attached.

The production and preparation costs for Volume #132 amounting to \$7028.90 have been paid. This is the second volume printed by the University of Toronto Press at greatly reduced costs compared to previous volumes.


143 copies (8 free of charge) of Volume #132 were mailed to subscribers on 16 August 2002. This was only 1 fewer than Volume 131 in 2001. About 73 subscriptions have been paid to date.

Invoices were also sent to authors for page charges and reprints on 26 August. Payment has been received from 3 authors for Volume 132 to date. There is still one outstanding page charge for Volume 131.

A large surplus of 9,815.86 was generously given to the Entomological Society of Ontario by the organizing committee of the 2001 ESC/ESO Annual Meeting.

\$10,000 was invested in 2002 Ontario Savings Bonds. Three-year, fixed rate, compound interest Bonds with an annual interest rate of 4.625% were purchased. At maturity these bonds will yield \$11,452.70

The Society is in sound financial shape and has a large surplus this year as a result of the modest printing costs for volume 132 and the large surplus from the 2001 Annual Meeting.


We are currently in the 'idea generation' stage, so anything goes at this point. Please get involved and help our Society promote entomology in Ontario.

2002 Election Results


The nominations committee of Gard Otis (Chair), David Hunt, and Barry Lyons provided a full slate of candidates for the Society's election. There were two candidates for President-Elect, three candidates for the two Director positions, and two candidates for Student Representative.

Ballots were mailed with the June, 2002 Newsletter and candidate's biographies were also included in the Newsletter. A total of 122 ballots were mailed with the newsletter to amateur, student and regular members. Retired members do not have a vote. Ballot envelopes were opened and votes were tabulated on August 1st. Fifty-nine ballots were returned prior to the August 1st deadline, which is exactly the same number as the previous year and the year before that!

The successful candidates were Jim Corrigan for President Elect, Miriam Richards and Tracey Baute for the Directors positions, and Heather Mattila for Student Representative.

About the ESO


The Entomological Society of Ontario (ESO) is an active society, dedicated to furthering entomology through annual meetings and publications. Over the past 140 years, it has served as an association of persons interested in the science of entomology. Today, as always, members of the Society have varied entomological interests; physiology, taxonomy, ecology and pest management. Although founded by amateurs, whose active participation is encouraged today, the majority of the Society's members are professionals, sharing their interests and expertise while working either in Provincial or Federal governments, industry or universities within Ontario as well as other parts of Canada and the world.

Joining the ESO entitles you to an annual subscription of the Journal of the Entomological Society of Ontario, receipt of ESO Newsletters, and attendance at the Society's annual meeting. It also provides an opportunity for you to meet and exchange information with other individuals involved in entomology throughout the province.

The Entomological Society of Ontario (ESO) was established in 1863 for "all students and lovers of entomology who shall express their desire to join it and conform to its regulations." The society was founded by three naturalists from the Toronto and London areas and it is the oldest entomological society in Canada, and the second oldest in North America.

Initially, the Society had 22 members in Ontario who were "interested in entomology". Two of the original three founders went on to shape entomology in Canada: C.J.S. Bethune, Head of the Entomology and Zoology Department at the Ontario Agricultural College in Guelph (1906); and William Saunders, Director of the Experimental Farms of the Dominion of Canada in Ottawa (1886).
